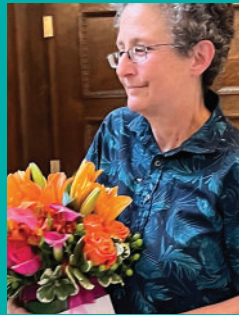

► Jewish Justices of the Supreme Court

Eight Jewish lawyers have served as justices in the US Supreme Court, and what an interesting bunch they’ve been. They varied in their relationship to Judaism, and all of them were accomplished students and lawyers. We will touch upon the operation of the federal courts in general and the surprising

relationship of many of the justices to the presidents who appointed them. Classes will include a mix of lecture and discussion, including stories about the justices’ personal and professional lives, on and off the Court. I’ll seek your opinions of their decisions and dissents, especially those concerning religious controversies.

Readings: Occasional handouts will be placed on the class website.

Morning Study Groups

► Introduction to Jewish Genealogy:

Learning the Tools to Help Discover Your Jewish Roots

Through lectures and discussions, members from the Jewish Genealogical Society of Greater Boston will help you develop the skills for researching your Jewish family history. Topics will include major online resources for finding ancestors and relevant records in the United States and Europe, identifying family lost in the Holocaust, and using DNA testing to uncover family connections.

The course is designed both for beginners and for those who have begun their family research. Participants should know how to do basic internet searches and to log onto websites.

Readings: Readings will be from internet websites and placed on the class website.

► Short Stories: Three Distinct Voices

We'll read stories by Raymond Carver, Chimamanda Adichie, and Edith Pearlman—two by each. These masters of the genre give us very different worlds to visit: a bridle abandoned in a bureau drawer by a man who could not leap far enough, a plane crash in Nigeria summoning two gods in New Jersey, and a castle near Boston with a beautiful lady waiting to die and an ugly guard with a kind heart. There will be one story a week to read at home. I will share some information about the writers in class to put the stories in context, but most of the time will be spent in discussion.

Readings: Stories will be chosen from three different books, *The Thing Around Your Neck* by Adichie, *Cathedral* by Carver, and *Honeydew* by Pearlman. The stories will be placed on the class website.

Morning Study Groups

▶ Your Spiritual Legacy: Writing your Life

In Judaism we honor our ancestors. We read Bible stories over and over again and learn something new each time. We cling to these stories as a foundation and as a path toward the future. The stories of our own lives can also bring meaning to our family and friends, grounding them in the past and providing them a model for living, and provide a way for us to discover ourselves.

This workshop will give you the opportunity to write your story. You will be prompted to remember and write about the moments from your own life that are most meaningful to you -- moments that inspired you, and perhaps moments that, through pain, led to growth. You will be writing your spiritual legacy.

Reading: All reading will be done in class with available Bibles.

Afternoon Study Groups

▶ The Old Masters and the “Old Testament”

We walk through the world’s great art museums. We see paintings by Caravaggio, Rembrandt, Poussin, Velazquez, Rubens. We pass flights into Egypt, crucifixions, saints performing miracles. We pass Venus and Cupid, Leda abducted by a swan, Paris choosing Aphrodite. And we also pass Abraham sacrificing Isaac, Susannah being spied on by the Elders, David with Goliath’s head.

What stories from the Hebrew Bible attracted these great artists? Why were so many artists attracted to the same texts? In this study group we will first read and discuss the sources in the Tanakh (Hebrew Bible) on which so many paintings are based. We will then look at different artists’ interpretations of the same story and ask: What aspects of the narrative do they choose to depict? How do their interpretations differ? Do their treatments of these subjects differ from their depictions of Christian or mythological subjects? Why do these differences exist? What did these pictures mean to their original audience? What do they mean to us? Two hours of preparation each week.

Reading: Any translation of the Hebrew Bible.

▶ Listening to and Loving “Roots Music”: Country and Bluegrass

We will explore American history through "Roots" music (country and bluegrass), examining the lives, careers and canons of several significant artists (Jimmie Rodgers, the Carter family, Bill Monroe, Hank Williams, to name a few). Our syllabus will also include “Singing Cowgirls/Cowboys,” “Outlaws and Country Queens,” (Johnny, Willie, Waylon, Loretta, Dolly, Tammy), and so much more. We will consider how the complex political and social environments navigated by country and roots music artists shaped their music and public personas. Listen, discuss, and learn about the richness, variety, and relevance of these gems of American music. No prior interest or knowledge required — come be surprised!

Reading: We will have weekly reading/watching/listening “assignments.” Recommended book: *Country Music USA*, 50th Edition by Bill C. Malone and Tracey E.W. Laird, 2018 (\$27.95 on Amazon, paperback). Recommended watching: "Country Music" series by Ken Burns (available to stream on PBS or Amazon Prime). Other readings will be provided on the class website.

Afternoon Study Groups

► The World of Sepharad: the Jews of Spain

Jews lived in Spain for over a thousand years until the expulsion in 1492. This study group will discuss the origins of the Jewish population in Spain, the arrival of the Muslims in 746, the period of convivencia (coexistence) when Muslims, Jews, and Christians created a culture of tolerance in Medieval Spain, and the period of Christian rule that led to the expulsion and dispersal of the Sephardim. A major part of the study group will concentrate on the 11th-13th centuries which is considered the Golden Age for Jews in Spain. Some of the most influential Jewish thinkers such as Maimonides and Nahmanides lived in Spain. In class we will read and discuss poetry by Yehuda Halevi and Shmuel H. Nagid from the Golden Age.

Afternoon Study Groups

▶ Shakespeare's *Antony and Cleopatra*: An Immersion in Shakespeare

Bennett Simon (bennett_simon@hms.harvard.edu)

We will immerse ourselves in Shakespeare's *Antony and Cleopatra*, a tragedy suffused with intense erotic power and a lust for political power. The protagonists, Cleopatra and Marc Antony, are incandescent as they traverse the universe. This study group will focus on reading the play aloud with intertwined discussion. We will use film to deepen our understanding of character. Prerequisites are an interest in knowing more about Shakespeare and a willingness to participate in reading in class. No prior knowledge of Shakespeare or of this play is required. Two plus hours per week of preparation.

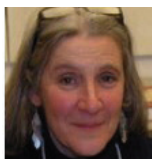
Study Group Leaders



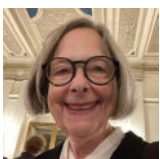
Carol Agate (*Jewish Justices of the Supreme Court*) practiced law in California and served on the ACLU Los Angeles Chapter advisory board. She worked in both civil and criminal law, later as an administrative law judge. Her women's rights case went to the US Supreme Court.



Jessie Klein and Carolyn Kohlman (*Introduction to Jewish Genealogy: Learning the Tools to Help Discover Your Jewish Roots*) are the immediate past co-Presidents of the Jewish Genealogical Society of Greater Boston, and are instructors in their annual genealogy course. Jessie has been researching ancestors in Poland and the Austro-Hungarian Empire for 15 years. Carolyn's family research focus is on Germany, areas of German-American immigration and the Holocaust.



Bob McCorkle (*Short Stories: Three Distinct Voices*) is a retired third grade teacher who has also taught adult literacy and a poetry course at TILLI. Gathering these stories gave him the chance to find voices new to him and to encounter characters not easily forgotten.



Peggy Morrison (*The Old Masters and the "Old Testament"*) has a PhD in English and American Literature and has taught at the secondary and college levels. She is interested in the intersection of art and literature and has studied both art history and biblical and rabbinic texts at the graduate level. She participates weekly in Torah Study.

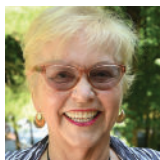

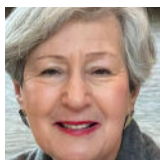

The Foundation is located in the couple's historic Greenwich Village townhouse, where Gross had studio space. In 2009, the Foundation opened to the public the building's third floor living and dining space.

The Foundation stewards an extensive collection of over 12,000 objects that includes Gross's sculptures, drawings, and prints; a photographic archive; and Gross's large personal collection of African, Oceanic, Pre-Columbian, American, and European art that remains installed in the townhouse as Gross had it during his lifetime.
